GUILDFORD SHAKESPEARE COMPANY AND COVID-19

This document has been put together following the release of the government's advice and is designed to help keep you safe from the transmission of COVID-19. We have put together a detailed risk assessment and implemented enhanced health and safety practices and will go through this with you on your first day on site.

General Guidance

- 1. Wash your hands often and thoroughly with soap and water. There will also be hand sanitizer stations for you to use.
- 2. It is not required that you wear a mask or any other PPE unless you want to or are required to as part of your costume.
- 3. We ask that everyone continues to consider each other's sensibilities with regards to distancing.

Sessions

- 1. If you test positive for Covid-19 then please stay at home and contact the facilitator
- 2. Where a participant is displaying symptoms but has not tested positive, they may be asked to wear a mask and/or socially distance during sessions.
- 3. Time to be given in sessions to use the toilet to avoid queuing. Toilets to be cleaned following each session
- 4. Bring as little into the space as possible.
- 5. Do not share pens/pencils.
- 6. Rehearsal room doors and windows should remain open when possible, to ensure sufficient ventilation.

Retuning to sessions post covid

- 1. Where a participant is no longer displaying symptoms but is testing positive beyond Day 5 and before Day 10, (this will be reviewed on a case by case basis,) but we will consider the option to return to sessions, but the following mitigating factors may be considered:
- Wearing a mask in rehearsals
- Keeping a 2m distance from other participants
- Keeping windows and doors open
- Working outside in the open-air
